

Summers are always busy and that has certainly been true for our rescue group here in Minnesota this year. It seems like we barely get one dog in their new home when another one comes along. Fortunately, we have found homes for a few, so dogs are getting placed.

Currently in rescue is Roscoe. He is a three year old, very handsome boy whose former owner was moving into town and didn't feel he had the time or the right home for him any longer. He is being fostered by Kathie and Andy. Roscoe gets along great with their dogs as you can see by the photo. He does have some issues with separation anxiety and Kathie is working with him on learning to wait calmly at the door instead of bolting through it or grabbing feet when he doesn't get what he wants. We have had quite a few inquires about Roscoe, but because of these bad habits, he needs just the right home for success.

staying with the Deb and Don. Reggie can still be a handful at times, but he is getting better at minding his manners. Deb said that he likes to climb up with Don in the recliner and fall asleep with his head on Don's chest. We have a "meet and greet" scheduled soon, so fingers crossed things will go well and Reggie will finally have a forever home.

Tess was recently adopted and we are very grateful to her new owner that she was willing to take a chance with an older dog. Tess is a bit of a "cranky old lady" to other dogs and toddlers, but is as sweet as can be around adults. She deserves



a good home as much as the younger dogs, but it was a challenge finding her a suitable home. Tess was in foster care at the Guthmiller home since the end of March, so we are very happy she now has a home of

her own. It has only been a few days, but she seems to be adjusting to her new life pretty well.

Tilly was also at my house, but just this past weekend went to live with her new family. We found that Tilly doesn't always get along with other dogs, so had to find her a home without other dogs and those can sometimes be hard to find as the majority of applicants who want to adopt a Bulldog already have at least one other dog.

Tomorrow our rescue will be getting in another Bulldog. He is coming from the Brown County Shelter. He was supposed to have been a stray, but the shelter discovered the person who brought the dog in was, in reality, the dog's owner. It was a good thing the vet who ex-





amined "Hector" recognized him, so at least we have some background info on him. I spoke with a shelter worker who said the owner was excessively rough with Hector when he brought the dog in. It sounds like he actually did Hector a favor by surrendering him to the shelter. Nancy and Bill are going to foster Hector and we will be evaluating his temperament before placing him into a new home since we don't have much info about his background.

I'd like to thank everyone who is fostering rescue dogs for BCARN – MN. I am very grateful for their willingness to help out. Foster volunteers are a rescue group's biggest asset. Foster volunteers provide an invaluable service by tak-

ing these dogs into their homes. Without foster homes, we could not continue doing breed rescue as many of the dogs that come into rescue need additional training or behavior modification before they can go to new homes. Deb & Don, Kathie & Andy and Nancy & Bill are all "first timers" when it comes to fostering. I hope it will have been a positive experience for all of them and they will have considered it time well spent. With the larger number of dogs coming into rescue, we will have a real need for additional foster homes. Soon I will be moving "into town" and I won't be able to foster multiple dogs at once like I have in the past. If you have ever considered the possibility of being a foster "parent" for a rescue Bulldog, but would like more info before deciding, please feel free to contact me and I will be happy to provide you more info.

If you cannot commit to fostering at this time, there are other ways to help out. For instance, volunteers can perform home visits or check out dogs at shelters to confirm that they are purebred. If you have any dog-related items that your dog no longer uses or plays with, don't throw them away, odds are we could find them a home too. Just bring them to a Wrinkle Time meet-up and we can recycle them for you. In the past, people have donated crates, collars, dog beds and toys. Some dogs come with lots of things when they are surrendered, and those items go with the dogs to their new homes. But some dogs like Hector, come with nothing and it is nice to have them go to their new home with some things that have familiar smells. No effort is too small and all is appreciated.

#### Basic Rules For Dogs

**DINING ETIQUETTE:** Always sit under the table at dinner, especially when there are guests. That way, you can clean up any food that falls on the floor. It's also a good time to practice your sniffing.

HOUSEBREAKING: Housebreaking is very important to humans, so break as much of the house as possible.

**GOING FOR WALKS:** Rules of the road: when out for a walk with your master or mistress, never go to the bathroom on your own lawn.

COUCHES: It is perfectly permissible to lie on the new couch after all your humans have gone to bed.

**PLAYING:** If you lose your footing while chasing a ball or stick, use the flower bed to absorb your fall so you don't injure yourself.

CHASING CATS: When chasing cats, make sure you never quite catch them. It spoils all the fun.


