As I've said before, veterinary procedures can be expensive and many times the adoption donation does not cover all of the expenses associated with the rehoming of every dog. It is great when we receive additional donations as we do not want to be in a position where we have to withhold veterinary care from a Bulldog that needs it simply because we don't have the funds to cover it. Since we are not funded by other organizations, we depend solely on local donations from individuals to cover all of our expenses.

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What's a "hot spot"?

In bulldog baby talk, it's an "owie". Usually something has irritated the skin, under the fur. It could be a wet spot that never dried, soap residue left after a bath, a bug bite, or a nip from another dog. Lots of things can cause a hot spot. Most of the time what happens is it is irritating and the dog scratches it, making it even worse. When the owie weeps or drains it can drain under the fur and "mat" the fur down with blood and serum (fluid that is part of the blood).

If you think your bully has a hot spot, take him/her to the vet. What they will usually do is shave the spot down and prescribe topical and / or oral antibiotics and medications. Shaving the fur helps air get to the spot so it can heal quicker and you can keep an eye on it.
