# Help! Help! Help!

# From Nose to Tail

This section is intended for questions and answers (as well as opinions) about what has worked best in your house for things from nose wrinkles to tear stains to tail pockets. Keep in mind this is not veterinary advice and what works for one bulldog may not work for the next.

### This Month's Question:

7 mo old Bulldog knawing (sic) sheetrock so it indents wall, eats off wooden outlet cover and now broke off 4 slats in our door. How to control? He will be shown in ring so neuter isn't an option.

7 mo old Bulldog possessive towards our Cavalier regarding his toys, bones and treats. He will take over toys our other dog has and will hold a stiff stance and bark once at our Cavalier if he thinks she's too close to bone. He's okay with humans messing with his toys and dog food while he's at it. What to do that won't get in way of training him to show in ring.

7 mo Bulldog seems to not know his own strength when playing with our Cavalier. He makes her yelp and she squeals when he bites her tail and ear. Is this normal? Is there anything I should do?

- •Just from what I read, sounds like your bulldog needs more supervision, more boundaries and more appropriate things to do. Make sure he has appropriate things to chew on when he is in his kennel. Kennel him when you cannot directly watch him. If he begins doing something inappropriate while you are watching him correct him then give him the RIGHT thing to chew on and praise him.
- I've never had a problem with teaching a dog basic obedience and showing them in the show ring.
   One thing to do differently is to teach them to STAND while heeling rather than sit while heeling.
- •Exercise him. Walks are great for redirecting that puppy energy.
- •Contact an animal behaviorist—not just a trainer. Behaviorists usually come to your home to assess what is going on in the pack
- Take some training classes. You'll both learn some things.

- •Regarding destruction: If your Bulldog is being destructive, you are giving it too much freedom. Crate him with a good chew toy that he likes when you are not able to supervise him.

  Once he is older he can safely be given more freedom, but if you continue to let him destroy things, you will be allowing him to learn a lot of bad habits that will be a lot harder to break as time goes on. You have to supervise him more closely. He is still a puppy, even if he does look almost grown. You can also try putting on some "muscle rub" like Ben Gay on wood furniture that he tries to chew on. It grips better than Bitter Apple and usually the smell alone is enough to keep a puppy from chewing on it.
- •Regarding action possessiveness: Show dogs need manners the same as a "pet", if not more so as they are expected to behave under stressful, noisy conditions. Take him to a good puppy kindergarten class or a basic obedience class at an obedience training center...not the kind that PetSmart or PetCo offers. Those have too many distractions and the training area is too small to do any real good, in my opinion. They can learn basic obedience even if they are going to conformation training class. Your Bulldog is behaving in a dominant manner towards the Cavalier. Even if the Cavalier is smaller, it should rank over a puppy. You may be inadvertently reinforcing this belief. The older dog should always be fed first, petted first, etc. Look into the "no free lunch" training methods. You can find a lot of info for free online if you Google it. Also you should purchase the booklet How To Be The Leader Of The Pack by animal behaviorist Patricia McConnell PhD. It is a fast read, and inexpensive, but lots of good info.
- •Regarding your other dog: Your puppy seems to naturally dominant as most puppies don't challenge older dogs at such a young age. He is in need of some consistent discipline or you may find yourself with a doggie juvenile delinquent.

  Your puppy doesn't seem to have been taught "bite inhibition".

They usually learn this from their mothers and littermates. For whatever reason, your Cavalier isn't teaching your puppy manners, so you will have to do it. Get a squirt bottle and put in some water and a little vinegar. Teach him some sound that is a warning if he crosses a line. Most trainers suggest the "Uh uh" sound rather than "NO". It should be a phrase not used in normal conversation. Warn him with the "UH Uh" sound and then squirt him in the shoulder with the spray if he picks on the other dog. The smell is unpleasant to them, but doesn't hurt them

and is usually enough to make them learn to respect the "Uh uh" warning. They usually learn pretty quickly that UH uh means they'd better stop what they are doing.

Is there anything I should do?

Get your dog to a training class ASAP. You might also want to contact an animal behaviorist for advice. They come to your house and give you "lessons" on how to train your dog. Well worth the money if you can afford it.

### BCARN—MN Rescue



BCARN – MN Rescue Update:

We currently have five Bulldogs in rescue in Minnesota. Ruben has found a new home and is doing well. We found him a home in a semi-rural area where dog walkers are infrequent and can't get close to the house, so we are pretty confident Ruben will have no more incidents of territory guarding. Still in need of a home is Tess. We have someone interested in her, so hopefully she will

be on her way to a new home soon.

Ruben's sidekick "Sophie" is ready for a new home, but we are still evaluating applications for her. She's a little cuddle bug. She loves climbing up into a person's lap and laying her head on your shoulder. That is when she isn't licking your face and ears. She can be a little dominant around some female dogs, so she'd probably do best in a home with a male dog, rather than female. She is in good healthy and super cute. She's on the smaller size and is pretty easy going.

Two young female Bulldogs were picked up as strays in Maplewood. They had been picked up last summer as strays, but this time around, the owner said he had sold the dogs and would not claim them. However, he said he could not recall the new owner's name or


phone number and no one ever showed up to claim them. So our info about these two girls before they came into rescue is limited to their names. We have Sophie (the 2<sup>nd</sup>) and Amber. They are estimated to be under two years of age, but over the age of one. Both are very sweet dogs and get along well with other dogs. Amber is fine with the foster home cats and Sophie has been great around the children she's been introduced to while at her foster home. cause they are both young, we have received a lot of inquires about them and hope to have them in forever homes soon.

Sophie II and Amber have now been spayed, wormed, vaccinated and checked for heartworm. Sophie also received entropian surgery on both eyes as both of her lower lids were rolling inward. They will also be microchipped before placement. They are house-trained and crate trained. Both dogs flinch easily and act very submissive, so we suspect their former owner was pretty heavy handed in dealing with

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them. The families that adopt these two sweet girls will have to be patient with them until they learn to trust their new surroundings.

Our latest rescue addition is another youngster. Reggie is only 8 months old. Although we do have some paperwork on him, such as his age and his breeder, we don't have much more than that. A coworker knew Deb had adopted Cupid from our rescue group and said she knew of someone who had to give up his Bulldog as his mother was fed up with the puppy in her house. Kind of "he goes or you go" scenario, it sounded like. Well, the co-worker showed up one night at Deb's work place with Reggie in tow. Seems Reggie was stuck down in the basement most of the time and

received very little attention.

Reggie is a sweet boy, but starving for attention and in need of some discipline and obedience training. Reggie will go in next week to be neutered, vaccinated and checked for heartworms. He too, will require eye surgery. He

has a "cherry eye" that needs to be taken care of. Otherwise, Reggie seems to be in very good health. He will make someone a great companion once he has been taught some manners.
